All but Battle Ground ace levy elections

Seven out of eight isn't bad, and absentee ballots may yet pull it our for the Battle Ground School District, whose special levy request was failing to make the 60 percent test by 79 votes.

Early absentee ballot returns, and those who went to the polls Tuesday, resoundingly approved special levy requests for the Vancouver, Evergreen, Camas, Washougal, La Center, Woodland, and Green Mountain School Districts

While Battle Ground voters approved that district's special levy by s 6,955-to-4767 majority, the 59.33 percent won't cut it. Property tax measures in Washington must get a 60 percent majority to pass.

Several thousand absentee ballots yet to be counted could turn the election around for Battle Ground.

Very high majorities prevailed in Camas, where 70.5 percent of the voters approved a transportation vehicle fund levy, and 68.36 percent approved the maintenance and operations levy.

The Vancouver schools' levy passed by 69.66 percent, and the Evergreen district's levy was approved by 66.71 percent of the voters. The Washougal and Green Mountain School Districts' levies passed by 69-plus percent.

Prior to joining the city, Smith had served as the senior Army advisor to the 104th Army Reserve Division at Vancouver Barracks.
