Park service allocates local Lewis and Clark dollars

The National Park Services has announced it is providing an additional \$50,000 for the Cathlapotle Plank House project at Ridgefield, and another \$10,000 for improvements at the Capt. William Clark Park at Cottonwood Beach in Washougal.

The Cathlapotle project, expected to cost \$517,540, will result in a replica of a longhouse seen by Lewis and Clark in 1805. The \$52,000 Cottonwood Beach project will help develop the mile-long Columbia River frontage park. The Corps of Discovery spent several days at the site in 1806 on their return east.
