


Regents give local WSU campuses more autonomy; Vancouver will expand academic programs, improve communiy college transition

Sweeping changes granted by Washington State University's board of regents last week pave the way to greater autonomy Washington for State University Vancouver and allow the will local university more leeway in providing blended degree programs for community college students.





Effective immediately, Chancellor Dengerink

and deans of the Vancouver, Tri-Cities and Spokane campuses become chancellors in the new state-wide university system and will participate in a new President's Council, consisting of university president **V. Lane Rawlins** and the university provost.

WSU Vancouver needs to expand accros the spectrum of academic programs, says WSUF chancellor **Hal Dengerink**. "The university is committed to making the expansion through additional and innovative partnerships with local commuity colleges and special institutes."

With the support of Clark College and Lower Columbia College, Longview, WSU Vancouver is developing blended degree programs that assure freshmen that provided they maintain academic standards, that they can move seemlessly from community college classes to WSU Vancouver toward completing their degrees.

While the regents' action does not make WSU Vancouver a four-year university, it does point the way for further changes, Dengerink says.

Former Chrysler dealership building on Mill Plain being used for police and fire training
