Bob Beck, former *Columbian* reporter and editor, died Saturday from traffic mishap

Bob Beck, Washougal, former *Columbian* reporter and editor, died Saturday in a Portland hospital after having been struck by a car while riding his bicycle in Camas on March 15.

A celebration of Mr. Beck's life will be at 4 p.m. Saturday, April 12, at the Homestead in Washougal.

Mr. Beck, who was 74, is survived by his wife, Margie; two daughters, Laurie Carley, Olympia and Wendy Beck, Camas; three sons, Douglas, San Jose, Neil, Woodland, Andy, Washougal; and five grandchildren.

Mr. Beck was an outdoorsman and local explorer, known for his sense of humor and exceptional writing skills. After retiring Mr. Beck drove a school bus—because he liked to.

JD White Company selected to manage construction of major Lewis and Clark park

The JD White Company is being awarded a \$370,000 contract for permit management and construction supervision of the \$3.2 million Capt. William Clark Park at Cottonwood Beach through the Vancouver-Clark Parks and Recreation Department.

The park, at Cottonwood Beach, is a partnership effort among Clark County, Camas, Washougal and the Port of Camas/Washougal. It is expected to become one of the principal tourist stops along the Lewis and Clark Bicentennial trail.

Symphony bash raises \$24,000

The Vancouver Symphony Orchestra's Spring Intrigue, a masked ball at Royal Oaks Country Club, earlier this month raised over \$24,000 for the symphony.

The dinner, auction and dance contributed to the symphony, commemorating the orchestra's 25th anniversary, the largest single donation ever received, according to event chair **Bergen Peterson**.

The 65-member professional orchestra is in the middle of its 2002-03 season.

David Douglas's 1827 trek to Hudson Bay from Vancouver to be retraced

A five-month-long trans-Canadian expedition to Hudson Bay begins at 10 a.m. Sunday, March 30, for a crew of adventurers in a 26-foot-long birch bark canoe from Vancouver's Marine Park.

They will retrace an historic expedition led by botanist David Douglas from Fort Vancouver in 1827.

Douglas, a Scottish botanist, for whom the Douglas fir (actually a species of pine) was named, explored Washington and Oregon in the mid-1820s before making the successful expedition to Hudson's Bay and the northern limits of North American vegetation.

The crew—Sylvain Cordeau, expedition manager and forest technician; Vincent Athias, architect and painter; Sebastian Pandolfi, navigator; Gilles La Niece, biologist

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and botanist; **Samuel Duc**, botanist; and **Frank Blanchi**, cameraman—will make camp at the park later this week.

The crew's focus on history and education is meant to compare the evolution of flora along the route over the past 176 years. They also expect to make a film and publish a book about the adventure.
