Commissioners ratify road plan as a prelude to building Legacy Salmon Creek Hospital

A deal calling for Legacy participation in \$4 to \$6 million in road improvements at the NE 134th Street corridor, accepted by Clark County commissioners and Legacy Health System yesterday, paves the way for construction of a 220-bed acute care hospital at the southeast corner of NE 139th Street and NE 20th Avenue.

A few more hoops remain, however. The county must reduce its 22-mile-an-hour standard for travel along the 134th Street corridor to 13 miles an hour. Commissioners will take this up at a regular meeting Tuesday, April 1.

A county hearings examiner, who heard Legacy's proposal earlier this month, has to approve current plans.

Provided the county does change the standard, a 16-month-old-moratorium on development will be lifted, and additional housing and commercial buildings are expected.

Legacy construction would begin with a seven-story parking structure and a medical office building. If all goes according to plan, Legacy Salmon Creek Hospital would open in mid-2005, according to **Joe Kunkel**, who will be its administrator.

Legacy has agreed to widen the I-5 northbound exit to 134th Street to four lanes, build I-5 overpass on 139th Street and make other improvements on 134th, 139th Streets and 20th Avenue.

The county has agreed to working out a formula whereby new developments, which would benefit from improvements paid for by Legacy, could reimburse Legacy for some of its original costs.
