Clark Care and Development Center presenting awards for caring hearts

Caring Heart Awards for eight individuals and one company are being presented by the Clark Care and Development Center at a 6 p.m. Saturday, March 29, dinner at the Heathman Lodge.

The awards, being given this year for the first time, honor those who have provided outstanding community service for children with special therapy needs or adults with employment barriers.

The Clark Care and Development Center was founded in 1963 by parents of children and adults with disabilities to ensure that appropriate community services and opportunities are available. Programs are provided by Vancouver Children's Therapy Center, Kid's Care, Caring Connections and the Encore Group NW.

Being honored at the dinner are:

- **Burgerville USA**, for its sponsorship of local organizations and for its being a leader in hiring people with disabilities.
- **Charles Fuchs**, physician with the Evergreen Pediatric Clinic, who has worked effectively with children with disabilities.
- **Rita and Bob Gaylor**, CEO of Clark Care and Development, who have donated his salary back to the center.
- **Tom Cone**, Vancouver School District assistant superintendent, who founded the Fir Grove Regional Day Treatment Program and the Vancouver Early Childhood Center.
- **David Cooper**, executive director of ARC of Clark County, who has been an effective advocate for people with disabilities.
- **Lee Robbins and June Napoli**. Robbins established the Clark Care and Development Center endowment fund with a gift of \$30,000. Napoli's countless volunteer hours helped upgrade technology at the center.
- **Darrel Stump**, Clark County Facilities manager, who has provided support and employment for people with disabilities.

Rebound first in the northwest to capture X-ray pictures using digital technology

Using a new adaptation of CCD imaging technology originally developed for space exploration, Rebound Neurosurgical divisions of Northwest Surgical Specialists are capturing X-ray images directly into digital format.

The new digital X-ray imaging technology, similar to digital photography, produces a higher quality image than

the conventional chemical process. The images are available for immediate review and consultation.

In addition to being much faster, the digital X-ray process is accomplished with a 30-to-50 percent lower radiation dose.

Rebound, whose specialists are team physicians for the Portland Trail Blazers, Portland Winter Hawk and Portland State University, has offices in Southwest Washington Medical Center and at the Rose Quarter in Portland.
