### Utility reroutes power to bring light to 11,000 customers in north Vancouver

A 7 p.m. power transmission interruption of unknown origin left 11,000 Clark Public Utilities customers in the dark for nearly an hour and 40 minutes in some cases last night, prompting early closures of some businesses and restaurants in the Vancouver Mall area Hazel Dell, Orchards, Minnehaha and Walnut Grove.

Extra police were called to duty to cover blacked-out traffic-light intersections. No injuries were reported.

**Andy Huck**, utility director of operations, said power was restored to most customers within an hour after utility crews rerouted power within the utility's redundant system.

Huck said a circuit breaker failed at the Ross substation at the Bonneville Power complex in Hazel Dell. No physical damage to transmission lines was found.

The utility's customer service Powerline fielded 800 calls. As calls came in, recorded messages were set up to explain the outage and give estimates to customers as to when power could be expected to come back on.

Washington's non-adjusted unemployment rate rose four-tenths of a percentage point to 7.4 percent."
