# 992-8000 sheds light on darkened customers

It turns out that as many as 1,500 calls were made to Clark Public Utilities Customer Services' 992-3000 telephone number and as many as 8,000 calls to the utility's 992-8000 Powerline number Monday when over 11,000 customers were darkened by an early evening outage triggered by an opened circuit breaker.

Of the 1,500 calls made to the utility's customer service number, about 800 were answered by customer service representatives who work round the clock at the utility, according to **Mat McCudden**, utility manager of customer services

When not answering customer calls, the 12-hour-pershift employees perform routine utility administrative functions, says McCudden.

The utilities' 992-8000 Powerline number, on the other hand, is automated, and response is immediate.

If but one customer reports an outage, the system automatically produces a job ticket alerting the utility dispatcher of the specific outage triggering repair assistance.

If large numbers of calls are received, as was the case Monday, the system is revised to provide ongoing responses to callers letting them know the kind of outage that occurred and an estimate of when it will be fixed.

Both of the utility's telephone numbers give callers an option if they report that the loss of power poses a health threat. Customer service assesses the customer requirements and alerts appropriate back-up systems.

# Local employment picture seems brighter

According to January unadjusted employment numbers for Clark County supplied by the state Employment Security Department, the county gained 5,400 new jobs since January 2002.

Department figures show January 2002 employment at 166,600, compared to January 2003 employment at 171,800.

However, Clark County's workforce increased by 1,400 in the same period to 186,000 workers.

Clark County's seasonally unadjusted jobless rate for January 2003 was 6.8 percent. It stood at 7.6 percent in December 2002, and 9.7 percent in January 2002.
