Dane Anderson wins 2003 George C. Marshall Youth Leadership Award

Dane Anderson, Prairie High School senior, has been named the 2003 General George C. Marshall Youth Leadership Award winner.

Anderson, who was nominated by Clark County Commissioner **Craig Pridemore**, was one of 39 high school-age county residents nominated.

Anderson has served in student government at Prairie High School for the past four years. He has been a Clark County youth commissioner for the past three years and has chaired the Clark County Freedom's Answer Movement. He also has been a member of the Washington Association of Student Council's executive board and, for the past two years, has been a representative on the National Association of Student Councils.

Anderson receives a \$1,000 scholarship, and a paid summer internship in the Vancouver Celebrate Freedom office, the organization sponsoring the award.

An award ceremony at 3:30 p.m., Thursday, March 6, in the Water Resources Education Center has been organized by Celebrate Freedom, PeaceJam Northwest, the YWCA and the Vancouver Cultural Commission.

Nobel Peace Laureate **Riggoberta Menchú Tum** will be the lecturer at the ceremony.
