Vancouver's legislative priorities—money

Vancouver's 2003 state legislative wish list is heavily weighted toward money, reports the city's governmental affairs consultant, **Mark O. Brown**.

The priorities are:

- A \$17.7 million state appropriation for Columbia River channel deepening.
- \$12 million from the capital budget to finance a Vancouver crime lab, as requested by the state patrol.
- A \$4 million capital budget expenditure for the Maya Lin Confluence Project, which includes two interpretive art projects in the Vancouver area.
- \$18 million from the capital budget for construction of a Clark College building at the Washington State University Vancouver campus.
- A \$30 billion statewide appropriation, as recommended by the Blue Ribbon Transportation Commission, with 85 percent of the new revenue returned to the county of origin.
- \$200-to-\$250 million in annual state revenues given to cities and counties as partial replacement of lost local revenues.

FERC delaying standard market design rate after getting heat from public utilities

The Federal Energy Regulatory Commission is delaying its process to implement a standard electricity market design nationwide, according to Clark Public Utilities spokesperson **Mick Shutt**.

Shutt says FERC chairman **Pat Wood III** reported that the plan has been under heavy criticism from public power systems, consumer advocates, members of Congress and state regulators, among others.

Northwest Power Works, representing Clark Public Utilities and other public power systems, has said that the SMD design is fatally flawed and would cost the Pacific Northwest region as much as \$500 million a year in increased power rates.

According to Shutt, FERC's delay will allow Congress to review the proposal further.

Deb Wallace bill would increase state transportation system accountability

The Washington State House Democrats released their transportation accountability plan Wednesday, and one of three bills that would implement the plan is House Bill 1121, sponsored by Rep. **Deb Wallace** (D-17th). This bill would require ongoing performance audits of the state Department of Transportation.

A bill introduced by Rep. **Jeff Morris** (D-Anacortes) would abolish the state Transportation Commission and make a state transportation secretary a gogubernatorial appointee. Another bill introduced by Rep. **Sandra Romero** (D-Olympia) would create a citizen oversight panel to measure the performance of the transportation system.
