

County gets \$15.5 million share of state capital budget

The capital budget approved during the 2006 state legislative session provides over \$15.4 million for Clark County projects.

Clark Public Utilities share is \$5,087,250 for water system improvements. The Battle Ground-Salmon Creek wastewater treatment plant receives \$4 million. The Washington State Patrol Vancouver office was allocated almost \$3 million to complete the Vancouver Crime Lab. \$2.2 million was allocated for Vancouver road improvements on NE 138th Street. The City of Washougal is allocated \$2 for its sewer system.

In addition, the Lewis and Clark Confluence Project was awarded \$500,000, the State School for the Blind, \$200,000, the State School for the Deaf, \$200,000, Clark County, \$200,000, and the Miracle League Baseball Field for People with Disabilities, \$57,000.
