A U.S. Military Academy West Point graduate, Knight earned a master of business administration degree from Golden Gate University.

Knight has held the post of vice president of administrative services at Clark College since 2004.

Knight has been acting chief of the college since the resignation of former president **Wayne Branch** last summer.

According to trustee **Addison Jacobs**, who, with trustee **Kim Peery**, coordinated the process of selecting an interim president, Knight possesses the attributes most frequently mentioned by the college community, including a desire for continuity, local connections, staying the course on the college's strategic plan and initiatives, and an open communication style.
