The novel is about a woman returning to her ancestral Virginia tobacco farm, who discovers her childhood diary, which discloses the causes of her present-day regrets.

Casswell lives in Vancouver with her partner, Walt Griffith, and, in publishing house promotion parlance, "her somewhat nutty cat, Shima."
