Employers add jobs in June, unemployment holds steady

Washington employers added 3,800 non-farm jobs in June, and the seasonally adjusted unemployment rate remained unchanged at 5.1 percent, the state Employment Security Department announced today.

Annual non-farm job growth in the state was 3.3 percent, compared to a national rate of 1.4 percent over the year.

In Clark County, however, the number of jobs declined from 188,300 in May to 186,700 in June—a total loss of 1,600 for the month,—according to the Employment Security Department. Some 91,700 net new jobs were created in Washington from June 2005 to June 2006. The construction industry continued to lead growth over the year with 19,300 net new jobs, but has slowed recently, adding 100 jobs in June. The aerospace industry has added jobs every month since the Boeing strike in September 2005, adding 500 jobs in June.

By contrast, retail (minus 300), leisure and hospitality (minus 200) and information (minus 100) all reported job losses over the month.

"Job growth has slowed to a more sustainable pace over the last couple of months, but that's to be expected after the near-record growth we saw throughout 2005 and early this year," said Employment Security Commissioner **Karen Lee**.

Vancouver loses good Russian friend

Vancouver lost a great friend, Igor Valerievich Chkalov, the bigger-than-life son of the world famous pilot Valery Chkalov, who died July 10 of lung cancer at the age of 78.

Mr. Chkalov was nine when his father, Georgy Baidukov, and Alexander Belykov landed the single engine ANT-25 in Vancouver on June 20, 1937, after an arduous 63-hour non-stop fight over the North Pole from Moscow, Russia—and put Vancouver in the world's spotlight for several days.

Mr. Chkalov was expansive, gregarious, hot tempered at times, and a dreamer, who couldn't imagine the world, especially Vancouver, forgetting his father.

Known for his passionate vodka toasts and crushing Russian bear hugs, Mr. Chkalov insisted on quoting his father's speech, given from the balcony of General Marshall's house in 1937: "There are two rivers, the Columbia and Volga, which are found on different continents, have different dispositions and characters, and whose shores are enclosed by dissimilar mountains and forests. They flow on one and the same planet, however, not

troubling one another; and, in the final analysis, turn out to be elements of the same world ocean.

"And so must the peoples of Russia and the U.S. live on the same globe peacefully, and with cooperative effort decorate this ocean of human life...."

Mr. Chkalov gave the last 31 years of his life to promoting that goal, in great part by using his considerable influence in high Russian political and social circles to attract national Russian attention to Vancouver citizen efforts to honor his father and the flight.

It was largely due to Mr. Chkalov that Vancouver has been honored with visits from such dignitaries as Russian mayors, governors, generals, and cosmonauts. Vancouver citizens have experienced official receptions at the Moscow Mayor's office, the Russian Duma, and by the Governor of the State of Nizhni Novgoro. Vancouver delegations have repeatedly been shown on Russian national television.

When Mayor Royce Pollard presented Mr. Chkalov with a certificate making him an "Honorary Citizen of Vancouver his excitement and surprise lasted until early morning hours and many vodka toasts later.

Last Saturday, Mr. Chkalov was buried in Novodevichi Cemetery beside his mother. Some of his famous neighbors in the cemetery are Chekhov, Gogol, Bulgakov, Shostakovich, Scriabin, Khrushchev, Molotov, Gromyko, and Stalin's wife, Nadezhda.

Mr. Chkalov loved Vancouver; he will be sorely missed.
