A \$40,000 educational grant for the Vancouver National Historic Reserve Trust was presented to trust president **Elson Strahan** by First Lady **Laura Bush** in Washington last week.

He added, "The funding will enable us to secure the expertise to review and revise K-12 curriculum to ensure that our educational programming at Fort Vancouver, Pearson Air Museum and the Water Resources Education Center is consistent with both Washington and Oregon standards."

According to **Tracy Fortmann**, superintendent of the Fort Vancouver National Historic Site: "We have well over 30,000 students who come to the historic reserve each year. This grant will help launch our

new education plan. We will bring more life to the Historic Reserve's rich legacy."
