County discount prescription drug cards available to all

Discount prescription drug cards, offering holders an average discount of 20 percent on drugs that are not covered by insurance, are available to all residents of Clark County through an arrangement between the Clark County Public Health and the National Association of Counties.

The cards are free. One card will be issued to each person or family. There isn't even any paperwork to fill out.

The cards currently are available at the Center for Community

Health, 1601 E Fourth Plain Boulevard, and the Public Service Center, 1300 Franklin Street. As supplies become available, the cards can be picked up at city halls in the county, at Fort Vancouver Public Library branches, and from some pharmacies.

The program is administered by Caremark.

The *Insider* tested the cards by going to the company's Web site, https://naco.advance.rx.com. We found one prescription drug for which there was no discount, but found another there for which the savings was over 50 percent when the drug is ordered from Caremark.

More than 90 percent of pharmacies in Clark County are participating in the program, according to **Maureen Taylor**, Health Access Program. health educator. For further information, call Taylor at **397-8000**, extension **7308**.

Clark Public Utilities may increase water rates in 2007

While Clark Public Utilities' commissioners are not considering any electric rate increases for 2007, the same may not be true for the nearly 30,000 utility water customers.

Utility commissioners will consider one of three alternatives when the final budget is presented at a 9 a.m. Tuesday, Dec. 12. The most costly alternative for residential consumers would be an increase of about 13 percent, to \$26.70 per month.

Currently Clark Public Utilities' water rates are the lowest in the county, except for those within the Camas city limits, based on 1,400 cubic feet of water use. Clark's residential charge is \$23.50 a month. Vancouver's water rates range from \$23.56 within the city, to \$35.34 outside the city.

The commissioners will also be considering tiered water rates to discourage water use during summer months.
