Port of Kalama has bragging rights again

As it does annually in its fall newsletter to constituents, the Port of Kalama recites its high standing among the ports of the West Coast.

A little more than 30 miles north of Vancouver on Interstate 5, the Kalama port is one of the biggest grain shipping ports in the Pacific Rim.

During 2005 the Port of Kalama shipped over 8 million metric tons of grain, making it second only to the Port of Portland in total tonnage of exported bulk cargo. In the state of Washington the port ranked third after the Ports of Tacoma and Seattle in total tons of shipped cargo.

The combined total general cargo shipped from the Ports of Kalama and Vancouver, which includes lumber and steel, nearly equaled the total from all other Washington Ports, including Seattle and Tacoma.

Just over 1,000 are employed in Kalama industries, according to former Vancouverite and Port of Kalama commission chairman **Fred Swanstrom**.
