# Baird says he supports Indian Gaming Bill but votes against it

U.S. Rep. **Brian Baird** (D-3rd) today expressed his support for modifying the Indian Gaming Regulatory Act to restrict off-reservation gaming, then explained why he voted against it. "I support this legislation," Baird said, "however I cannot in good conscience vote for an enormously consequential bill that was denied due process by the people's elected representa-

The proposed gaming bill was brought before the House of Representatives in a form that prohibited amendments and debate.

Baird said, "A sufficient number of my colleagues had serious concerns with this legislation. They were denied the opportunity to debate this important issue and engage in fair up or down votes on their amendments."

The bill, which required two-thirds approval in the House, failed by a 247 to 171 vote.

"I have worked hard to ensure that Southwest Washington gaming issues are fair and transparent. This same principle should apply to gaming issues affecting all Americans," Baird said.
