Archaeologist **Amanda Joy Bush** offers new insights into downtown Vancouver from the city's founding in 1857 to the end of the Victorian era in 1901, during a Museum After Hours lecture at 7 p.m. this evening in the Clark County Historical Museum, 1511 Main Street.

Bush has given several lectures on archaeology and Victorian Era fashion and has studied how Victorianism was expressed in the Vancouver

area by studying clothing and fashion-related artifacts found at historic-era sites in downtown Vancouver. She is also a published author on cultural resource management on Easter Island. The title of her presentation is "The Victorian Individual as Displayed through Fashion."

Battle Ground freeway connection work to begin this spring

A \$29 million project that will extend Highway 502 from Battle Ground west to a direct interchange with Interstate Highway 5 begins this spring. Woodburn, Ore., contractor Kerr Contractors submitted the winning bid for the work that is supposed to be completed in 2009.

Funding for the extension of Highway 502 and the I-5 interchange came from the "nickel" gasoline tax approved by the state legislature in 2003.

The direct connection will take Battle Ground traffic off the NE 179th Street fairgrounds I-5 interchange.

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Community Foundation grants total \$263,000

The Community Foundation, with assets of over \$52 million, today announced grants totaling \$263,000 from the Children's Trust Fund and the Community Giving Fund.

The largest grant, \$30,000, was made to the Principal's Checkbook Program. The program enables school principals to pay for students' emergency needs, such as shoes, clothing and food.

Share, which provides housing and means for homeless, received two grants totaling \$20,000. The School of Piano Technology for the Blind was awarded \$16,775 for the purchase of Braille notebook computers.

New daylight savings time schedule unaccounted for by some programs

Daylight savings time on a new federally mandated schedule comes three weeks early this year and thereafter, catching many computer programs off guard.

Microsoft Outlook programs that contain appointments, for example, will be one hour off during the period from Sunday, March 11, when daylight savings begins until Sunday, April 1, when daylight savings used to begin.

There are some complicated fixes for late March appointment schedules, but the easiest is to remember that scheduled appointments will be an hour earlier during the three-week period. The reverse will be true during the week of October 26, when standard time comes a week later.
