Hagley family adding to Marshall awards collection

Marshall awards are stacking up like pancakes at the Hagley family households. In 1996, **Tom Hagley**, Jr., Director, Community & Government Relations for Vancouver Public Schools, received a George C. Marshall Award. In 2000, his wife, Juliet Laycoe Hagley, was honored as a Marshall Award recipient. Not one to let the youngsters take all the glory, Tom Hagley Sr., a University of Oregon journalism professor, now has a Marshall Award of his very own. He is the proud recipient of the 2007 Jonathan Marshall Award for Innovative Teaching in Journalism and Communication.

Hagley lives in Brush Prairie and teaches at the University of Oregon's School of Journalism and Communications three days per week. He joined the UO faculty in 2001 following semi-retirement from a 30-year career in public relations. The award is presented to instructors who "help students gain new insight and strengthen professional skills." Teachers are nominated by students. Nominees are then judged by a panel of emeritus professors.

Camas teacher Mark Gardner named Regional Teacher of the Year

Lauded by students and colleagues as "the real deal," Camas High School teacher Mark Gardner was named 2008 Regional Teacher of the Year for the ESD 112 region.

Gardner started an innovative and successful transition program for struggling ninth graders entering high school, and is described by Camas administrators as "the heart and soul" of the Freshman Success Academy at Camas High School. He is one of nine finalists for the Washington State Teacher of the Year. Winner of the state award will be revealed during an October press conference in the Seattle area.

"If you are looking for a teacher who connects with kids and motivates them to perform at their very best, Mark's the guy," says Camas Superintendent Mike Nerland. "He is student-centered, creative, enthusiastic - and one of our state's most talented young teachers."

Fort Vancouver officials announce exciting changes for 2007 Candlelight Tour

The National Park Service promises to wow visitors with a new look at the past at the 2007 Campfires and Candlelight Event.

Formally known as the Candlelight Tour, this year's event will take place on September 15, 2007 from 4 to 10 p.m.

Visitors touring the fort will experience firsthand what the Fort was like in the year 1846 on a specific day — the day the news of the shipwrecked U.S.S. Shark reached the fort, triggering an intense relief effort.

Unlike at past tours, reinactors will engage in conversations with tour-goers, while remaining "in character." Fort officials said the change will make this event more dynamic and involve the visitors intimately in this portrayal of history at a time of great transition. Visitors will still see favorite activities from past years: inventories taking place in the Fur Store and Indian Trade Shop as well as the laborers hard at work in the Blacksmith Shop and Carpenter Shop. Conversations in the Mess Hall will center on the political implications of the shipwrecked U.S.S Shark and in general the politics of the year, 1846.

Food vendors will be on hand at the beginning of the tour, located at Pearson Air Museum as well as a gift shop at the end of the tour.

For those visitors interested in a sit-down meal, the partnership opportunity extends with The Restaurant at the Reserve, located in the Grant House. The Restaurant at the Reserve will open at 4:00 p.m. and offer one free kids meal with the purchase of each adult entrée.

The fort hours of operation will be 4:00 p.m. -10:00 p.m. for the event on Saturday, September 15 and
